A GREAT LOSS

Inna lillahi wa inna ilaihi raji'un

The Ahmadiyya Muslim Community in the USA and all over the world heard with great sorrow that our beloved Amir, Hazrat Sahibzada Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad Sahib, passed away after a long illness on July 22, 2002. *Inna lillahi wa inna ilaihi raji'un* (To Allah we belong and to Him do we all return). He was a grandson of the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him), son of Hazrat Mian Bashir Ahmad (r.a.) and son-in-law of Hazrat Musleh Mau'ud, Mirza Bashiruddin Mahmood Ahmad, Khalifatul Masih II (r.a.).

The funeral prayers, led by Acting Amir Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA, Dr. Ahsanullah Zafar, were held at Masjid Baitur Rahman on July 26, 2002 at 9 PM. Close to two thousand Ahmadis from all over the USA joined in the funeral prayers. Amir Sahib Jama'at Ahmadiyya Canada, along with 150 members of the Canada Jama'at also attended the funeral prayers.

His body was taken to Pakistan for burial in the *Bahishti Maqbarah*. Funeral prayers were held in Lahore, led by Mirza Khurshid Ahmad, Nazir External Affairs and Sadr Majlis Ansarullah Pakistan. In Rabwah, the funeral prayers were led by Sahibzada Masroor Ahmad, Nazir A'ala. The burial took place in the *Bahishti Maqbara* of Rabwah, where he was buried in the special section, by the side of Hazrat Chaudhry Muhammad Zafrullah Khan Sahib (r.a.).

Before assuming the position of Amir, Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA, Hazrat Mian Sahib had a very distinguished career as a civil servant, statesman, and leader in economic development. Even as he was engaged in these activities, he remained the trusted advisor of three *Khulafa* of the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him), and of the Amirs of the Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA.

He was a very devoted follower of the Khilafati Ahmadiyya and many of his addresses, and schemes were permeated with the spirit of following up on the directives from Hazrat Khalifatul Masih IV (a.b.a.). Even his daily talk was full of devotion to the Khilafat. Similarly, he was eager to honor and establish the Nizam-i-Jama'at (established system of organization in the Community).

One of his special contributions to the Jama'at Ahmadiyya was in the financial field. When he assumed the leadership of the Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA as Amir in 1989, the annual budget was 1.357 million dollars. In the last year of his leadership, the budget had increased to 8.5 million dollars (an increase of 526%). He was instrumental in motivating the Jama'at to take the first position in *Waqfe-Jadid*, which increased from \$11,231 to \$600,870 during his leadership, and in *Tehriki-Jadid*, which increased from \$128,933 to \$631,315.

Da'wat Ilallah was his special concern and his meetings with the missionaries as well as the Aamila devoted great attention to propagation.

He followed up vigorously on the desire of Hazrat Khalifatul Masih IV (r.a.) to build mosques in the USA. More than 20 Mosques and mission houses were built/acquired during

the 13 years of his tenure as the Amir. Specially important is the construction of Masjid Baitur Rahman, the new and beautiful Headquarters of the Jama'at, which was inaugurated by Hazrat Khalifatul Masih IV (a.b.a.) in 1994.

He was very eager to promote and cultivate friendship and brotherly love between the Ahmadis migrating from other countries to the USA and those, especially the African Americans, who have joined the Community in the US.

Help to the needy was a special concern of Hazrat Mian Sahib. Every Eid, and on all other occasions, he was generous in allocating funds to help the needy within and outside the Jama'at. His enthusiasm for Education and economic uplift of the Community was manifested in many programs, especially the Scholarship program, for which \$100,000

divided equally between loans and grants were allocated in the current fiscal year. He also established a Fund for the Development of African American Youth.

Hazrat Mian Sahib spoke with great passion about the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him)'s prophecies about the victory of Islam, which was frequently the main theme of his addresses in the Jalsa Salana USA, and Majlis Mushawarat. He was also very passionate about narrating his fond memories of Hazrat Musleh Mau'ud (r.a.).

Hazrat Amir Sahib was a grandson of the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him), son of Hazrat Mian Bashir Ahmad (r.a.) and son-in-law of Hazrat Musleh Mau'ud, Mirza Bashiruddin Mahmud Ahmad, Khalifatul Masih II (r.a.).

Even before his appointment as Amir Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA, Hazrat Mian Sahib's services to Pakistan, International relations and economic development, and to the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community USA and world-wide, were remarkable and distinguished. He served with distinction in the Indian Civil Service (before the creation of Pakistan), Civil Service of Pakistan, World Bank, and the Development Committee. Throughout this time, he was always available to give his services to the Khulafai Ahmadiyyat and to the Amirs of the Jama'at Ahmadiyya whenever called upon to do so.

He was appointed to the office of Amir Jama'at Ahmadiyya USA in 1989 and served the Jama'at up to the last breath of his life. Members of the Aamila will always remember His motto: What have I done today in the service of Islam/Ahmadiyyat?

Hazrat Mian Sahib was permeated with the

Love of Allah, and the Holy Prophet (Peace and blessings of Allah be upon him) and utter devotion to the mission of the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him). He spoke with great passion on these subjects. The Promised Messiah (peace be upon him)'s prophecies about the victory of Islam were frequently the main theme of his addresses in the Jalsa Salana USA, and Majlis Mushawarat. He was also very passionate about narrating his fond memories of Hazrat Musleh Mau'ud (r.a.).

He was a very devoted follower of the Khilafati Ahmadiyya and many of his addresses, and schemes wee permeated with the spirit of following up o the directives from Hazrat Khalifatul Masih IV (a.b.a.). Even his daily talk was full of devotion to the Khilafat. Similarly, he was eager to honor and establish the Nizam-i-Jama'at (established system of organization in the Community). He guided and encouraged the development of leadership in the auxiliary organizations.

Specially worth mentioning are his keen interest in the publication of several magazines and books, such as, Pathways to Paradise, Words of Wisdom, Welcome To Ahmadiyyat, Mosques Around the World, Ahmadiyya Jama'at's Services for Pakistan and Muslim Causes (Souvenir on the 50 Anniversary of Pakistan), and 50th Jalsa Salana USA Souvenir. He also fulfilled the desire of the Promised Messiah (peace be upon him) that the Review of Religions be published at least 10,000.

He was very eager to promote and cultivate friendship and brotherly love between the Ahmadis migrating from other countries to the USA and those, especially the African Americans who have joined the Community in the US.

M. M. AHMAD - SOME FOND MEMORIES

With the passing of Sahibzada Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad Sahib, Amir Jama'at USA, we have lost a distinguished leader and a great human being. Prior to becoming the Amir Jama'at USA, Mian Sahib served Pakistan as a distinguished leader in finance and then served the world community as a director of the World Bank.

Over the last decade or so, I had developed a very close relationship with Mian Sahib and I look back with fondness at this unique man who spent most of his waking hours in the service of the Jama'at. I thank God for this blessing and for this privilege afforded to me to spend so much time with Mian Sahib and to learn from Mian Sahib's vast experience.

I would like to share with the readers my observations with regard to Mian Sahib.

Mian Sahib demonstrated in his words and actions an unparalleled regard and respect for Khalifat. Whenever he wrote to Huzoor, he would write and rewrite his letters, making sure the letters were concise and to the point, as not to infringe unnecessarily on Khalifatul Masih's time.

In 1998, when Huzoor was here for Jalsa Salana USA, as was Huzoor's custom, Huzoor was staying at Mian Sahib's house. At Fajr prayers at Mian Sahib's house, some of us would also join in the prayers. Mian Sahib would say his prayers sitting on a chair at the extreme right of the front row. After the prayers were over, Huzoor would turn around on the prayer mat and talk to the gathering. During this process, Mian Sahib would slowly and unnoticeably slide off the chair and sit on the ground so as to be at the same level as Huzoor. He did this despite the pain and difficulty he felt sitting on the ground.

Another attribute of Mian Sahib was his humility and simplicity. A person of Mian Sahib's

stature and his accomplishments never let it be known by his words and actions that he was above everyone else. On the contrary, his demeanor was simple and he was a mild mannered person. This simplicity was also reflected in the workings of the USA Jama'at.

An attribute of Mian Sahib was his regard for time. He would strive to be punctual, despite the fact that his back pain was an impediment. Whenever I had an appointment to see Mian Sahib at his house, he would be ready and waiting. He once said to me that it bothered him when some people would show up an hour or two late without any valid reason and without calling to let him know that they were going to be late.

A special attribute of Mian Sahib was his propensity to seek diverse opinions on various Jama'at matters. His usual custom was that he would send a written note to various people. seeking their comments. In addition, during several of my visits with Mian Sahib, I would note that he would broach various issues with me, unrelated to my office. I am sure he did this with many other people as well. God had given Mian Sahib the wisdom to be able to discern right from wrong very quickly. He would reverse his prior decision if needed. Once a Jama'at meeting was organized, with Mian Sahib's approval, everything was in place for the meeting. I was invited to the meeting to provide MTA coverage. On looking at the program, I felt that such a meeting had a potential of undermining the system of our Jama'at. I sent a note to Main Sahib, expressing my view. Mian Sahib called me up to discuss my view point. A few minutes later, he canceled the meeting.

God had blessed Mian Sahib with a very kind heart. He always told me that we should focus on facilitating work and outcome rather than penalty and punishment. When penalty and punishment became due, he would agonize over it. I remember a time when he wrote to a person four times seeking some positive response so no action may be necessary. In some of our special meetings where we were doing some assigned work, I would note some letters written to Mian Sahib that were disrespectful and hostile. Yet these never seemed to bother Mian Sahib and he carried out his work with utmost integrity and justice.

Mian Sahib gave precedence to others over his own self. Once at a wedding, he tripped and banged his leg on an object. He got up and sat down on a chair through the wedding as if nothing had happened. When I went to see him a few days later, he had a big haematoma on his leg. He told me that he felt the haematoma developing as he was sitting at the wedding but he would not disrupt the happiness of the occasion by drawing attention to himself.

When my daughter Fatima's Nikah ceremony was to be held, on the occasion of the Jalsa Salana USA 2000, I had requested Mian Sahib to participate in the ceremony. The ceremony was held at Baitur Rahman Mosque after Maghrib and Isha prayers. Mian Sahib's work was done and he had to wait four hours to attend the ceremony. Yet he waited, despite my pleading that it was alright

and that he should go home.

At our weekend meetings at Baitur Rahman, Mian Sahib would bring his lunch with him, as would other attendees from the metro area. Without fail, Mian Sahib would insist that I have half of his sandwich.

Once Mian Sahib called me to come to see him for a medical need. The day I was to travel to see him, the forecast was for snow in the metro area. Mian Sahib had Zahir call me to tell me not to come till the inclement weather was over.

The hallmark of Mian Sahib's leadership was that he was always available and easily accessible. Those who became closely associated with Mian Sahib and followed his instructions and guidance, excelled in their work

Mian Sahib was a great asset to the Jama'at. He shared his life with us. The working organization that Mian Sahib put in place for the USA Jama'at over the last twelve years is perhaps the best in the world. Taking into account the limited manpower we have in the USA Jama'at, it is all the more astonishing that we have, by the Grace of God achieved so much. Mian Sahib's legacy continues. May his soul rest in peace.

A TRIBUTE TO MY MENTOR

To Him we finally return!

Today, Hazrat Sahibzada Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad Sahib is no more amongst us. His clear spirit soared at once to its accepted place among the fixed stars, in the firmament of rare immortals. His true life has begun with his death. I am induced to offer my personal sentiments at this solemn occasion.

To a child this world is everything; he seems to himself a part of his world – a part of this world in the same sense in which a branch is part of a tree; he has little notion of his own separate and independent existence, that is, he has no just idea he has a soul. He views himself merely in his connection with this world, which is his all; he looks to this world his good and when he tries to look beyond this life is able to discern nothing in prospect, because he has no idea of anything nor can fancy anything, but this life.

To understand that we have souls is to feel our separation from things visible, our independence of them, our distinct existence in ourselves, our individuality, our power of acting for ourselves this way or that way, our accountability for what we do

These are the great truths which lie wrapped up indeed even in a child's mind, and which God's grace can unfold there in spite of the influence of the external world; but at first this outward world prevails. We look off from self to the things around us, and forget ourselves in them. Such is our state – depending for support on the reeds which are no stay, and overlooking our real strength – at the time when God begins His process of reclaiming us to a truer view of our place in His great system of providence. And when He visits us, then in a little while there is a stirring within us.

The feebleness of the things of this world are forced upon our minds; they promise but cannot perform, they disappoint us. Or, if they do perform what they promise, still they do not satisfy us. We still crave for something, we do not well know what; but we are sure it is something which the world has not given us. And then its changes are so many, so sudden, so silent, so continual. It never leaves changing; it goes on to change, till we are quite sick at heart; then it is that our reliance on it is broken.

It is plain we cannot continue to depend on it unless we keep pace with it and go on changing too; but this we cannot do. We feel that, while it changes, we are one and the same; and thus under God's blessing we come to have some glimpse of the meaning of our independence of things temporal, and our immortality. And should it so happen that misfortunes come upon us (as they often do), then still more are we led to understand the nothings of this world; then still more are we led to distrust it, and are weaned from the love of it, till at length it floats before our eyes merely as some idle veil, which, notwithstanding its many tints, cannot hide the view of what is beyond it and we begin by degrees to perceive that there are two things in the whole universe - our own soul, and the God who made it.

We never in this life can fully understand what is meant by our living forever, but we can understand what is meant by this world's *not* living forever, by its dying never to rise again. And leaving this we learn that we owe it no service, no allegiance, it has no claim over us and can do no material good nor harm. On the other hand the law of God written on our hears bids us serve Him and partly tells us how to serve Him who is a righteous judge. Hazrat Sahibzada Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad

Sahib served Him in true vein and true spirit.

There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars; but star differs from another star in glory. To me that unique glorious star was Hazrat "Mian Sahib" - my mentor. Today, for some it might be a melancholy day of his death but I see the rich and incomparable fulfillment of his life. In his death his virtues have rolled like a snowball which will keep on rolling of which there is no parallel in the world.

It is rare to be fortunate in life, it is infinitely rarer to be fortunate in death. It is comparatively easy to know how to live but it is beyond option and choice to compare the most difficult art of knowing when and how to die.

We cannot deny the truth that human being is like an oak tree. The acorn of which is planted in the clay, struck its tap-root, then rose into a stem which spread into a branch and in the whole the oak completed its symmetry, stature and perfection. But when that oak attains its maturity and has run through its period of time, it begins to decay. The sap sinks to the root, the leaves begin to fall, the sprays wither, the branches decay and fall from the trunk, the trunk becomes hollow and the tree disappears in the dust. The last few years of Mian Sahib life had been years of great physical pain, yet he turned it to a brave, cheerful unflinching face.

I served him as his Secretary for over a decade. He was a giant of a person both in the physical sense and in mental capacities. He was a whole man in his stature, symmetry, and countenance, the whole human being with outlines and type which belongs not only to man in general, but to a particular individual.

Men are not equal, they are variously endowed and some have capacities and qualities and energies far beyond others. He was that person.

He had self control, the will and in obedience to Khalifat there was no match to him. He had his own individual gifts and capacities.

Each human soul that is gifted above its

fellows, leaves as it passes out of the world, a light of its own, that no other soul, whether more or less greatly gifted could give equally. As each lofty peak in some mountain is illuminated with a different hue of its own by the setting sun, so also, each of the higher summit of human being is lit up by the sunset of life with a different color derived, it may be, from the material of which it is composed or from the relative position it occupies, but each to those who can discern it rightly conveying a new and separate lesson of truth, of duty, of wisdom and hope.

What then are the special lessons which we may learn from the character of this remarkable man who has been taken away from us is, to pay, befitting tribute to his memory.

First, I perceive, there is that singular peculiarity which is within the reach of all of us. He accomplished the greatest success by the most homely and the most ordinary means. It is this which makes his life, in many respects, an example and encouragement to all. The persevering devotion of his days and nights in the service of Ahmadiyyat and toil and endurance of nearly two decades in a very high station of Amir of the USA Jama'at in which he was employed – these are the qualities which might be imitated by every single person of the Jama'at from the highest to the lowest amongst us.

Yet, whoever you may be, who are working zealously, humbly, honestly in your different stations, work on the more zealously and the more faithfully from this day forward.

He won his way with far-sighted wisdom, kindness of heart, tact and readiness. These were the gifts of God to him. "Never despair" so the vicissitudes of the octogenarian Amir seems to say to us.

I am one of those fortunate ones who is direct recipient of some of his words of wisdom.

Once when I asked him what is supreme good and what is the noblest object of desire, he replied, the greatest thing in the religious world is faith and next to it is love. Remember love is a compound thing which is like light. M. M. AHMAD - A DISTINGUISHED PAKISTANI PASSES AWAY

"Sada na baagi bulbul bolay Sada na rahndi husn javani, sada na rahnan bag baharan Sada na rahna maan pay, sada na sohbat yaaran"

So wrote the Punjabi Sage Mian Muhammad Baksh in his epic "Saiful-Muluk".

It was early Monday morning when my wife called me at work to tell me that "Mian Sahib" who was also know as Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad and M.M. Ahmad, had passed away. Many Washington area residents like me had known this decent man since he became a resident of Potomac, Maryland in 1972.

For many days, the Washington area did not get any rain and then on Monday night, it rained as if tears were falling from the sky. For one who was accustomed to meeting him frequently, it was hard to imagine that a friend would not be sitting impeccably dressed on his sofa anymore. Instead, one found countless sad faces, quietly mourning the passing away of a man they considered a part of their own family.

M.M. Ahmad is survived by his wife Mrs. Amtul Qayyum, son Zahir Ahmad, his daughter-in-law Tazeen Ahmad and two grandchildren, Muhammad and Marium. But there are thousands across America who mourn his death.

Born on February 28, 1913, in Qadian India, Mr. Ahmad was the grandson of Mirza Ghulam Ahmad, founder of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community – a peaceful movement spreading Islam in over 160 countries.

After completing high school in Qadian, India, Mr. Ahmad studied at the Government College Lahore and subsequently at London University and Oxford. He joined the Indian Civil Service in 1939, under the British Empire, and worked in senior positions until the creation of Pakistan in 1947.

Mr. Ahmad made enormous contributions to the civil service in Pakistan, when he rose steadily through the ranks holding positions such as Secretary Commerce, Secretary Finance, Deputy Chairman of the Planning Commission and Economic and Financial Advisor to the President of Pakistan

He represented Pakistan at several key events. He led a delegation to China in 1967 and to International lending institutions. Mr. Ahmad was a member of Pakistani delegation at key events Commonwealth Ministerial including the Conference. He was a negotiator with the World Bank for the massive Indus Basin irrigation project for Pakistan. Mr. Ahmad played a key role along with former US Secretary of State Henry Kissinger in arranging President Nixon's trip to China. In recognition of his extensive service, Mr. Ahmad received distinguished awards from the Pakistani Government.

Mr. Ahmad was appointed as an Executive Director of the World Bank for Pakistan and the Middle East. He also served as the Deputy Executive Secretary for a Joint Committee of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

A moment of silence was observed in memory of Mr. Ahmad by the speakers, scholars and the attendees at a conference "Taking Pakistan into the 21st Century", organized by the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars on July 24, 2002 in Washington.

Belonging to the Ahmadiyya Community, a minority group in Pakistan, Mr. Ahmad was subject to the wrath of extremists. In 1971, while in a government office elevator, Mr. Ahmad was stabbed by a religious extremist. Despite being seriously injured, he was able to subdue his assailant. His ability to withstand a brutal attack was due to his great physical condition - because of avid interest in sports such as tennis and hunting. The attempt on his life did not embitter his outlook, as he remained active and involved in community affairs. He kept his passion for reading until his last days.

Following his retirement from the World Bank, Mr. Ahmad became the President of the Ahmadiyya Muslim Community USA. He was admired and loved by the members of his community for which he worked until his recent illness.

Mr. Ahmad will be remembered for his dedication to public service and for the lesson he taught in asking his community members to ask themselves: "What have I done for my Community today?"

And to underscore his commitment, even on his death bed, Mr. Ahmad asking his assistant Dr. Zaheer Bajwa: "Did you bring my mail today?"

When I first met M.M. Ahmad sahib some thirty years ago, he was with the World Bank. I noticed whenever he came to Juma all the brothers would stand up as he walked in. M.M. Ahmad Sahib was appointed Amir of Jama'at USA. He was a stern and a no-nonsense person. Fair to everyone. You could see his religious side. Concern about the morals, prayers, Chanda paying and the well-being of us all.

He always encouraged us to attend all of the Jama'at functions and holy days. Sometimes he was greatly disappointed when we had a small turn-out, and of course very gracious when we had a large turn-out. May Allah rest his soul in perfect peace. Ameen!

REMEMBERING SAHIBZADA M. M. AHMAD

As I became able to read the newspapers during my younger years in Pakistan, Sahibzadah M.M. Ahmad was already in the news. My father had told me that he was a son of Hazrat Mirza Bashir Ahmad, Qamarul-Anbiya, radiyallahu 'anhu, who in turn was a son of the Promised Messiah, 'alaihissalam.

He was climbing the executive ladder fast and soon was heading the planning commission. I remember listening to his speech, alongside my father, the first time he presented the five-year economic plan on the Radio Pakistan. He was precise and to the point in his addresses. He would have contributed to the future of Pakistan much more if the rulers of Pakistan had not sacrificed the well being of Pakistan to appease the mulla for political convenience. By ignoring such selfless servants, successive rulers broke the basic Islamic principles of equity and fairness, thus bringing to the country despair after despair, leading to the present-day chaos and turmoil.

I had the honor of interacting with him on various issues related to the Ahmadiyya Community in the United States. He always extended his hand with a smile on his face and full attention. When I approached him with a proposal to start a magazine for children, he rightly guided me to get the opinion of the heads of the Lajna and Khuddam organizations in the States. Both of them were naturally supportive of such an endeavor and

provided their ideas on the structure and flow of the publication and the administrative strategy for this task. After examining their inputs, he formed a committee of highly motivated and deserving members of the Community to administer and oversee the publication. A long list of names for this publication suggested by members were submitted to him. He chose two of them of which one, al-Hilal, appears on the publication today. His selection of this name points to his strong affection for the language of the Quran and the familiar parallels given for the great Prophet of Arabia over the past many centuries.



In Washington, his home and family life was an epitome of Mughal and Pakistani culture.

He was a pioneer in giving Pakistani women professional exposure and direction. He would say that for Pakistan to pull out of poverty, Pakistani women needed to be financially independent and professionally able.

I feel that professionally and personally what I learned from him is far more valuable than anything ever taught in any Ivy League school or any institute under the sun. With ease, peculiar only to him, in a few minutes, he would come up with simple solutions for problems.

He spent his life serving humanity. From his juniors he demanded nothing less than perfection.

One early morning on the breakfast table, God blessed me with an opportunity to tell Mian Sahib when he was in good health: "I can spend my life thanking you and yet will not be able to thank you enough for what you taught me and what you gave me." From him we learned to enjoy the little wonders of life.

Such a man was M. M. Ahmad.

M.M. Ahmed – some personal memories

Mirza Muzzaffar Ahmed died rehabilitate the Muslim refugees. last week in Washington. Those who knew him well will remember him for his many rare qualities of heart and mind. Other Pakistanis of the post-partition era, right upto the Yahya period, will know of him from his long and distinguished record of public service.

I still remember my utter astonishment when I first heard of his poor academic record. Let us just say that, like Churchill and many others, there was no sign thereof possible future accomplishments. Be that as it may, he was amongst those select few to be chosen for the Indian Civil Service before World War II. After a brief training period in England he was posted as AC Khanewal.

At partition he was Additional DC Amritsar. Having opted for Pakistan he found the situation around him so perilous that, in spite of his official position, there was no safety in the short journey to Lahore. So he went instead to his ancestral home in Qadian (in Gurdaspur district) and flew from there to Lahore in a light aircraft. Amongst all his prized possessions he left behind was his brand new Chevy. This was retrieved for him some weeks later by my father who was in the Army and responsible for escorting many a refugee convoy safely across the border.

His first administrative job in Pakistan was as DC Sialkot, a focal point of the human cruelties and misery resulting from the , upheavals of mass migration. He worked feverishly to comfort and

At the same time he insisted that slain Hindus and Sikhs be given a decent burial as a matter of highest priority. Such simple humane acts of compassion could contribute to dampening the frenzy of violence just across the border. In another story of that era which he recounted later he told how Lady

Mountbatten (the Head of the Indian Red Cross) had ordered British Officers Sialkot to immediately send to Delhi a large consignment of artificial limbs lying in Sialkot. He went in person to the Railway Station to ensure that the

wagons were unloaded into his custody

Mian Sahib's next posting, as he laughingly put it, was as surprising as it was mysterious: DC in remote Mianwali. The silver lining however was the respect he earned of the Nawab of Kalabagh in the execution of his duties. This was to stand Mian Sahib in good stead when the Nawab became the Governor of the Punjab and Mian Sahib moved to the Lahore. Secretariat. His rapid rise saw him successively as Additional Rehabilitation Commmsstoner, Lahore, then as Finance Secretary Punjab and finally as Additional Chief Secretary for the Province.

The move to Islamabad and still

greater responsibility was not long in coming. In the Ayub era he was successively Secretary Commerce, then Finance Secretary and eventually Deputy Chief of the Planning Commission. As Economic Advisor to President Yahya he was probably the most powerful civil servant of the time with supervisory authority over

all the above three ministries. Those were the days, long gone now, when Pub-Servants were, by and large, held in high esteem. And Mirza Muzzaffar Ahmed was by common consent, the finest of finest.

Throughout his career there was not even an hint of the faintest whispher of malfeasance, of favours done, of corruption, of "accommodating" the powerful. He scaled the heights open to him by winning the respect of all those who came in contact with him. Such respect as we all know, is not easily won and requires more than just enormous proficiency in your work. For all his power and position, Mian Sahib was never arrogant, was invariably soft spoken, was a patient listener, was always fair and compassionate, and laughed easily and heartily. You could not fail to be touched by his essential humanity within minutes of meeting him.

Upon retirement from the Civil Service he was chosen by Bhutto to represent Pakistan on the World Bank Board of Directors. Here again his worth was recognized by Mc Namara who gave him many additional assignments particularly concerned with the problems of economic development in Third World countries. For the last thirty years or so Mian Sahib made Washington his home though his love for Pakistan and his many friends here ensured that he spent a part of every year in Pakistan.

He was of course a close friend of my father, so I have my own personal favourite story of him. When, some 40 plus years ago, I graduated from Government College Lahore I had the bright idea of applying for the Rhodes Scholarship. Hoping to impress the Pakistan Trustees I nominated Mian Sahib (who then was Additional Chief Secretary) as one of my referees. Naturally I had to get his permission for this so I went to see him and I have never forgotten his response. He said he would happily be a referee on the condition that I would give him the names of two of my teachers who knew me well so that he could first independently verify from them the details of my CV and what they thought of my fitness for the scholarship. No chance there for some extra much needed

M.M. Ahmad dies

WASHINGTON, July 23: A former finance minister and presidential adviser of Pakistan, Mirza Muzaffar Ahmad, died on Tuesday at a hospital in Maryland. He was 97.

He was an old heart patient. Better known as M.M. Ahmad, he served under two presidents, Ayub Khan and Yahya Khan.

In the early 1970s, he was stabbed inside an elevator in the Finance Ministry, Islamabad, by one of his peons. After which he moved to the United States where he rejoined the World Bank as a consultant.

M. M. Ahmad was the grandson of the founder of the Ahmadiya community. He has no children and had adopted one of his nephews, Zahid Ahmad.

OBITUARY

"HOW a few thousand men came to rule so many, so large and diverse a territory with so little use of force for 200 years" is a phenomenon unparalleled in the administrative annals of the world.

The territory was India and the core of the rulers was the fabled ICS, arguably the finest civil service in the world and, undisputably, superior to Britain's own home civil service.

A few score of them who fell to Pakistan's share, or opted to serve here, helped raise an administration which was able to withstand the stress of rehabilitating millions of refugees and, alongside, take care of the property of an equally large number

migrating to India. In dealing with this stupendous task and the temptations accompanying it,

most among them lived up to the tribute of the historians of the colonial period that they were "minutely just and inflexibly upright ... who used power not for selfish ends but as they thought was right".

By the passage of time and following the cycle of nature they have been departing one by one. The pace of their departure, by the same rule, has hastened in the recent past. M. Azfar, S. S. Jafri and Agha Hilali died in quick succession. Before them to go were A. A. Qureshi and Mian Riazuddin Ahmad. Some like Azfar and Qureshi were reclusive, others like Hilali and Nazir Ahmad were the soul of social life to the last days of their lives.

The latest to die is M. M. Ahmad on Tuesday at Washington. A deputy commissioner of early years at Sialkot and Mianwali - he bloomed into an economic expert of the government ending up in the World Bank / IMF. There were men more brilliant than M. M. Ahmad but, perhaps, none more trustworthy and hardworking. That quality made Ahmad a favourite of the Nawab of Kalabagh, Ayub and Yahya here and of Robert McNamara in Washington. His economic expertise and integrity all could rely on.

On hearing of his death — M. M. to his contemporaries and Mian Sahib to his younger colleagues

instinctively I thought of sharing the sad news with Syed
 Hashim Raza who at 92 is perhaps

the oldest surviving member of the ICS and three years older than the late Mian Sahib. Begum Raza told me he was too weak and depressed to communicate. And imagine just a few months ago he was an egregious citizen who regaled Karachi's diverse audiences with his poetry and reminiscences.

It thus became an occasion for a two-fold prayer: For the soul of M. M. Ahmad to rest in peace, he played his innings well and long, and for the health of Syed Hashim Raza to play it longer. The other two latter-day ICS living, I can recall, Agha Shahi and AGN Kazi in their eighties, are youngsters by comparison.— Kunwar Idris
